Roundabout Update:



Plans for the construction of two roundabouts on West Delmar became controversial when details were presented at a December 2022 public meeting. Public opinions ranged from the round-

abouts being a great idea to one of they should never, ever be built. Somewhere in the middle was the concern that IDOT planned to close West Delmar (Illinois Rt 3) for approximately one year to allow for construction. Such a closure would have created significant disruption of traffic flow in the area. With the expression of great public concern, Mayor McCormick, Amy Elik, CD Davidsmeyer and IDOT officials had several meetings to reevaluate construction plans.

As a result of those meetings and efforts, Tiffany Brase, IDOT engineer, has recently shared revised plans for development of the roundabouts.

The overall final plan for the roundabouts has not changed, but the staging of the construction has been revised. The plan revision calls for developing temporary routing of two-way traffic through the area while phased construction of the roundabout takes place. While traffic flow will be maintained throughout the process it will lengthen the construction time from one year to two years. 
