Using guidelines under a maintenance agreement, Riverbender.com will support the Village of Godfrey and the individual businesses to maintain current information.

In the future, a business may desire to have an enhanced custom video and information about their business. Such enhancements can be possible for additional costs to the business.

With any development, tweaking is common; but, feel free to visit the new site at: Www.VisitGodfrey.com Over the last six months the Village has partnered with BigZ Media to promote Godfrey and its business district. In that campaign, radio and print promotions have been executed in order to increase the awareness of Village attractions, businesses and assets.

One of the highlights of the program has been the featured monthly gift card program through the "gotogodfrey" program. The program will continue.

The program with BigZ media will continue for another six month campaign. It will be modified to drop the "Youtube" portion and provide increased focus on "Facebook" and email promotions.

The effort will also include promoting select events with businesses that agree to participate in the gift certificate program surrounding the Advantage News advertisements. The campaign will continue to utilize radio spots and print space in both Advantage newspapers.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE GODFREY TOWNSHIP CIVIC ASSOCIATION

The first meeting of what was to become the Godfrey Township Civic Association was held at the Godfrey Town Hall on May 3rd, 1948 with 52 residents of Godfrey in attendance.

Mr. Carl W. Kosanke, manager of the Greater Alton Association of Commerce, was the speaker. He outlined the procedure of organizing a civic association. At this meeting 15 board members were elected, with Mr. H. S. Sedwick elected President, Mr. E. G. Johnesse, Secretary; and Dr. W. W. Emons, Treasure.

The purpose of the Association was stated; "The Godfrey Township Civic Association , a nonprofit corporation, is organized for the purpose of advancing the civic, commercial, industrial, and general interest of the entire Township."

During the first year of the Association, it exerted a strong influence on the welfare of the community; effecting the establishment of traffic lights on Godfrey Road, for the protection of school children; and donating to the Godfrey Fire District, for the purchase of a resuscitator unit.

On September 15th, 1949, the membership voted to purchase the "airport property" on Tolle Lane (South Street), consisting of approximately two acres of land and an aircraft hanger building. Following this purchase there was a period of hard work, transforming the old "hanger" into a building suitable for the "Civic Center". In October 1949 the Editor of the Alton Evening Telegraph wrote in an editorial -- "Without a cent of federal, state, county or township assistance, the Godfrey folks are building themselves a fine center in which to assemble for social and civic events. A lot of the result has been largely from the sweat of their own brows, instead of the tears of their cries for help. The whole thing is as fine an evidence of the

resurgence of true American spirit as anything civic we've seen in a long time". Down through the years the Civic Center has been

used for countless purposes and the Association has

contributed much to the organizations of the Greater Alton Area.

The Civic Center Has Been used for purposes such as;

American Red Cross Blood Bank "Mortage Burning" of Civic Center-November, 1954 Junior Service League, charity programs Youth programs with the Y.W.C.A. Teen-Age Dances Local Church Fund Raising Dinners Godfrey Fire Department's Christmas Parties Polling place for all elections Junior and Senior High spring dances Girl Scouts, Browines and 4H Club meetings Kiwanis Club, Lions Club and Jaycees meetings Salvation Army Dinners Nike Base parties (U.S. Army Base at Grafton) Heart Fund March of Dimes and many others.

After a survey of the building in 1964, it was determined to try and build a new Civic Center, since time and the elements had dealt the old structure a hard blow. In the opinion of construction experts, it was useless to try and repair the old building, due to weakness of the basic structure.

In late 1965 a contract was awarded to Wilson Construction Company for construction of an all steel and brick building at a total cost of \$70,000. Total indebtness on the project will be reduced by Fund Raising Drives now in progress, and contribut-ions by individuals, businesses, and industries from throughout the area.

New Streets in Storyland and W. Woodfield



The weather has been hot, but that has not deterred construction of new concrete repair of streets in the Storyland and W. Woodfield neighborhoods.

The photo at the top is in Storyland where the streets are being repaired due to deterioration. This repair is the last year of a five year plan.

The lower photo is in W. Woodfield where the existing concrete streets are in disrepair and in need of replacing. This section is at the very end of W. Woodfield at the location of the culdesac. In this neighborhood, it is the first repair year of a two to three year plan. Eventually, all of W. Woodfield will be replaced.

Determination of repairs is accomplished by Village Engineering reviewing every mile of concrete streets every two years. The streets are analyzed for the degree of deterioration in order to prioritize repair efforts. For efficiency, scheduled repairs are concentrated in a subdivision or neighborhood.

Featured Business of the Month: Alton-Wood River Sportsmen's Club



One may not realize this fact, but the Alton-Wood River Sportsmen's Club is one of the oldest establishments in the Village of Godfrey.

According to an article in the archives of the Advantage, the Alton-Wood River Sportsmen's Club was chartered by the state as a not-for-profit corporation on July 9, 1947. It was started with 12 members who loaned the money it took to get started. The individuals were sportsmen who wanted a place to go hunting, but could not individually afford property. So they pooled their resources and bought property at the current location. At the time, the property would have been very rural.

Those first meetings took place in member basements. In December of 1948, the Board of Directors authorized the purchase of 53 acres in Godfrey (a portion of the current location) for \$10,000. The next year, a one-story clubhouse was erected. Over the next 25 years, the clubhouse would be renovated and expanded to accommodate the club's rapid growth. 1950 saw the addition of a fishing lake, with a trap house added in 1951, along with 711 acres (900 acres today) of river bottom land in 1953 in Pleasant Hill, III. In its heyday, the club reached 2,600 members. At one point, membership was so tight it was decided by a lottery. All was looking up until March 11, 1975, when the clubhouse burned in a blazing fire which left members stunned.

Rallying together, they pooled resources, funds, and hard work, and by the close of 1976 the club had a brand new, larger clubhouse, big enough to host dances, events, and a restaurant still in operation to this day.

During the 1980s and into the 1990s, membership dropped dramatically, as was the trend with many non-profit organizations.

The Club's Pleasant Hill facility is located approximately 5 miles south of Pleasant Hill, II. on 700 acres of timber and farmland with a 3-story clubhouse. There are 60 permanent camper sites and 3 temporary camper sites, all surrounded by woods on the Mississippi River below the Clarksville Dam. The boat ramp provides easy access to the river for eligible members. There are duck blinds, and deer stands available for members that are eligible to use them. The clubhouse has restrooms, showers, bedrooms, refrigerators, and a fully stocked kitchen. Camping is permitted year-round. You must be a Waterfowl or Regular Member to have a permanent camper site.

While the club's restaurant serves dinner to members and guests only, lunch is open to the public. Also open to the public are:

- Queen of Hearts on Mondays,
- Trap Shoots on Wednesdays; and,
- Bingo on Thursdays
