#### **Dealing With Yard Waste**



As a courtesy, the Village of Godfrey is now providing a drop-off location for yard waste for Godfrey residents. The site, located at 1433 Stamper Lane, will be open and accepting yard waste on Tuesdays and Saturdays beginning August 8th from 9:00 am – noon. Located to the west of Glazebrook Park, residents can enter the fenced area where an employee will then verify residency and assist in unloading the bagged yard waste from the vehicle before proceeding around the circular drive and exiting back onto Stamper Lane.

All yard waste (leaves, grass clippings, foliage, small branches, etc.) must be bagged in brown recyclable yard waste bags found at area hardware stores. Village of Godfrey yard waste stickers must be applied to each bag. These stickers are available for purchase for \$1.75 at St. Peter's Hardware in Alton and at Godfrey Village Hall in the Clerk's office. There is no limit to the number of bags that can be dropped off. No unbagged items will be accepted, and limbs

cannot exceed 4 inches in diameter and must be broken into smaller pieces in order to fit inside the bags.

At the time of drop-off, individuals will be asked to provide a valid IL driver's license or state ID showing Godfrey residency. If the person dropping off is doing so on behalf of a Godfrey resident, they must have a photo of the resident's driver's license/state ID AND a utility bill with matching address.

The hours and availability of drop-off may vary as the needs of the community are assessed. The drop-off site will be monitored via surveillance cameras and an attendant MUST be on duty at the site for drop-off. If misuse or dumping should occur, this service can be discontinued at any time and no refunds for purchased stickers will be given. For questions, call Village Hall at 618-466-3324.

Another Summer Program Starts Tuesday at Monti

Sure proof that summer is half gone, the mid-way point in the annual YWCA-sponsored program for youngsters of six years or more at Monticello College has been reached, and enrollment for another four weeks of fun and games on the Monti campus will be held Tuesday, along with the usual day's activities.

Since June 18, 60-120 young people have taken part in playground activities offered each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9 o'clock in the morning until 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Those taking swimming lessons, including life-saving courses, have numbered 175, and 90 have participated in two daily dips, which last until 5 p'clock. Evening dips for family groups are scheduled from 6:30-8 o'clock.

Godfrey Civic Assn. Helps Although there is a charge for the swirmming program, tennis and archery lessons, no other fees are asked. Godfrey Civic Association underwrites the cost of playground supervision.

Mrs. Fred Haper has been teaching nine half-hour swimming and hour-long life-saving classes. Miss Barbara Malcom has been life guard.

Literally everything under the sun, and also a few treeshaded pastimes, are available at Monti. Activities are scheduled according to age groups. Those in attendance take their lunches with them, and a lunch hour is held from noon to 12:45. Watermelon occasionally is served as a special treat,

#### Getting To Know Village Staff — Jim Lewis, Director of Public Works



"On call seven days/24 hours per day to manage conditions which demand an immediate response (storm cleanup, winter conditions, etc." This is a clause in the job description for Jim Lewis, Director of Public Works. Now that's job dedication!

Jim's job is to carry out the Board's vision for improvement and maintenance for all of Godfrey's infrastructures and properties. These assets include streets, roads, buildings and parks. In his job, he reports to the Mayor and works closely with the Trustees and the community at large. In fact, for some residents, he is the face of Godfrey.

Mr. Lewis grew up in Godfrey and has been a resident his entire life. In his early days he was employed by, then, Laclede Steel. Serving in various capacities for 29 years, he rose to the Mechanical Manager of the melt shop.

With the closing of Laclede twenty-two year ago, Jim came to work as Godfrey's Park Supervisor. In 2009, he was promoted to the Director of Public Works. He has eleven employees reporting to him, eight in the street department and three in parks.

Mr. Lewis feels that with increased costs of labor, materials and equipment, managing and staying within budget is one of his biggest challenges. Godfrey has one of the lowest property tax rates of all the surrounding communities. Additionally, there have been recent cuts to the Motor Fuel Tax (MFT). "We continue to strive for improvement and efficiency while paying close attention to the budget," said Jim.

One of the things that Jim enjoys about his job is interacting with the residents. He says, "I like being able to help people and seeing the infrastructure improvements that have been made under Mayor McCormick."

Mr. Lewis feels that Godfrey is a very nice town and enjoys the quality of life it provides. In fact, he lives in the same place where he grew up. In his free time he spends his time putting in a large garden and enjoying classic cars.

#### Commercial Property Enhancement Grant

Businesses located in the Godfrey Business District are eligible to take advantage of the "Commercial Property Enhancement Grant" program.

**Funding:** First \$5,000 — maximum grant is 50%; and, \$5,001 and above is 25% of eligible expenses. The grant limit is a maximum of \$20,000 per project.

Eligible Expenses: Significant facade renovations, signage, awnings, doors, windows. Landscaping if it follows Godfrey Ordinance No. 15-2007. Parking lots if brought up to ADA compliance and Village codes. All appropriate permits must be secured.

The grant must be approved prior to commencement of work.
